From the bottom of my heart I want to give a BIG THANK YOU for your serious and loyal support of the Dog and Cat Rescue Samui Foundation. Without you, there would be no help for stray dogs and cats on Samui. We have reached December again and 2012 is almost over – something I try not to believe, but my and Werner's bones tell us that we are growing older (old?) I am sure everybody is busy with all the Christmas hustle and bustle and lots of you will be preparing gifts and probably getting quite tired of the festive season process already! From December 20th -29th we are flying to Berlin, to participate at least somehow and will need quickly find some last minute Christmas gifts, as well as finding and decorating a Christmas tree and all of the other traditions which make Christmas a happy time. Christmas cookies will be one of the MUSTS, as well as cooking a beautiful family Christmas dinner at home. Of course we look forward to spending time with our family and friends and having a couple of days relaxing with them, just hanging around in front of the TV without dogs barking, staff or visitors dropping by, and emergency calls!

LINDA, a volunteer from Germany has been staying with us for a month and will continue until the end of January: she will live in our house and I'm sure will continue to do a great job. She knows by now how things work; JAY and LINDA, our long term volunteers, are here too, and BÄRBEL and GÜNTER will take care of the shelter. Very importantly we can also rely on our manager WIT.

I am very pleased that BÄRBEL and GÜNTER have finally settled for good on the island since October. In case you happen to come to Chaweng and try to find very good bikinis or beach dresses (even in large sizes!) you should look in some of the AMAZONAS shops. There I even found nice dresses for myself.

For many years they have been helping us in the DRCS and really care for the well-being of the animals. Bärbel continually keeps an eye on the "patient's" records and may perhaps find a couple of errors there, but of course the dogs love her all the more when she comes round the corner with a brush in her hand! A special "treat" for Bärbel is the new bath-tub and quite a number of dogs have been enjoying the water there! She also takes visitors around the centre and introduces volunteers to their new tasks.

Günter checks regularly where anything might need urgent repair. Then we would hold a meeting and discuss how we might solve our problems. At the moment we are struggling with the enormous amounts of water flowing through the center which leaves us with deep channels all over the place and, more importantly they are overfilling our waste water tanks! Every year we constantly try to improve our centre and our systems, but the center has got about 8 meters difference in altitude within a distance of 150 meters. We have constructed several terraces, but as always there are still possible improvements but you have only got a chance to find out if they work when it is pouring with rain and until the end of December it is





the rainy season. Until now we have not had too many problems, but this is no good either, as our tanks are far from being filled completely. Because of this we have had to buy lots of water in the last few months.

This is our water supplier. He has got a deep well and can arrive at the DCRS within 10 minutes when our water is used up. Unfortunately our volunteers and staff do not always share our water saving ideas and I can get very annoyed when the nozzles have vanished into thin air again and our water is pouring relentlessly from the pipes just because it is too far to go to the next water tap! As you know from my last two special newsletters we have had to take severe saving measures everywhere as a result of this!



HELPING HANDS

Last time I didn't introduce any helpers because, for the first time, we have had to release helpers due to lack of money. The two helpers hired last had to be fired first and as a disciplinary measure ROAD had to be transferred to do the single kennels job for allegedly embezzling money. Unfortunately we couldn't prove the matter 100%, then he himself offered to think about whether he would return to work with us and against all of our expectations he came back to his job! It goes without saying that I must carefully watch a couple of our helpers so that they do not "forget" to deliver the donated money! THAI was our manager in the shelter and he disappeared from the island without letting me know! He went to his mother's aid as his sister had died. Thai worked excellently and we miss him a lot, until now we have not found a acceptable substitute for him but he has left his wife, child and grandchild here and so possibly he will show up again one day, when his family business has been settled. It was a similar situation with GOON; after returning from a training course in Phuket he worked for one day and then was never seen again! After a week we asked his wife why he had not come back for work but she did not know where he was either! Meanwhile we have found out that he had most probably gone to his family but he has got a wife and two children in Koh Samui and we thought they were his family! Our Burmese WIN had "signed off" with me and faithfully promised to be back within four weeks' time and has never been seen again since! But WAT topped everything and everyone and we had to let him go after he took one of our sidecar motorbikes, removed the sidecar, sold it and then left the motorbike as security in a shop, as he couldn't sell it without the necessary papers! As far as I can see, he made a good job in the cat house but he was not well liked with the other helpers. As a result, we urgently need new helpers at the moment so that we can have suitable staff again!

I think we found a good one already: GUG has started working with us recently and I asked him whether he prefers working with dogs or cats. Then he gave me a radiant smile and said "cats"! Doesn't that fit perfectly!? He's now working in the cat house and has done a super job so far. Bärbel and Günter are very pleased to have him. He is really making a great effort and he has even got a driver's license!!!You understand that our complete organization depends on the helping hands. If they make a good job, things run smoothly. Therefore I am telling you repeatedly about our problems so that you can understand how difficult effective work is in Thailand. No one asks me BEFORE leaving whether he can get off: If the Thais are not keen on working, they just do not. Every now and then we try our best with small fines, e.g. when they forget to collect the small dishes after the rice "meals". If these are not



collected, the dogs use them as chewing toys. I had everybody sign this task, and please do not laugh; if I don't have them sign this order, they will all deny having ever heard about that...I hope we can find new, reliable and qualified helpers rather quickly. You know from former newsletter that I usually introduce new helpers every four months. This time I was only able to find just one and I am very unhappy because we

The hotel managers keep asking or even try to pressure me to remove the cats. But when we try to catch them for castration we aren't offered any help. WE can just amuse ourselves chasing them with the net...The cats shall just be removed and of course for free. Years ago you had a pack of dogs at every hotel; they kept the number of the cats down and prevented them from spreading all over the place. Please do help us and donate some Euros for vaccinations and castration.

TEMPLE PROJECT

Jay, Linda and Tom from the Temple-Team are also very happy, that the financial situation of the Dog and Cat Rescue has stabilized a little. For some months the Team were not able to deliver the amount of dog and cat food required to feed all the hungry mouths at the temples. The Team provides over 20 temples around the island with medical treatment and food. Due to our financial situation, only the very minimum of dog and cat food could be delivered to the temples so Jay and Linda started to divide one big 25kg of dog food into a few smaller black bags and delivered it that way, making sure everyone got at least a little something. The monks

were also very understanding and most cooked rice to mix through the dry food, stretching it that little bit further. As for the dogs and cats in the temples, well, they were just very happy to have some food every day. Thankfully we are now in the position to buy enough food again and have gone back to delivering the required amount of dog and cat food so no one has to be hungry.

Last month Jay and Tom rushed to the temple after an emergency call, where the monk awaited them with Burni in his arms and tears in his eyes.

His beloved cat had gone to the big kitchen area, where a celebration was ongoing and somebody accidently dropped a pot of boiling water, the cat was on the receiving end. Almost half of the body has been affected. The monk insisted on keeping the cat there and wanted to give the daily medication himself, as well as helping with the daily wound cleaning. Over the years this monk has learned a lot from the

After successful treatment over several weeks, Happy got bigger and stronger and joined the huge pack of dogs at the temple. We are not sure how it happened but Happy had a very bad accident at the temple and was then attacked by some dogs while she was already in distress. She suffered major bite wounds, which damaged one leg so badly, that it had to be amputated. It was clear that beside the wounds and the pain of the amputation, Happy had also pain in the second front leg but nobody on

the island was able to fix it. Our amazing Foster-Parents Mike and his wife who is a vet, decided to give Happy a new home and adopted her.

Knowing only a specialist vet in Bangkok could help Happy to walk without pain on three legs, Mike rented a car and took Happy to Bangkok for the operation. All went well and she can now finally live up to her name and live a happy life. Thank you Mike for not thinking twice.....

PUPPY HOUSE

Many times over the last two years we have mentioned how important Foster-Parents are and how much we appreciate people helping us to FIRST vaccinate our little 4 legged friends before they then -for whatever reason- come to the puppy house at our shelter. Once fully vaccinated, it is a lot less likely for them to get sick at the shelter. Jay and Linda -in charge for the puppy dogs- almost daily have to find ways to keep puppy families safe outside the shelter, until they are fully vaccinated. We are thankful for everyone getting out of their daily routine in order to keep some puppies at their place until they are double vaccinated and strong enough for the shelter. The vaccination program takes about three weeks and we can vaccinate the puppies earliest with 6 weeks. A big THANK YOU to Axel and his wife who kindly agreed to shelter 9 puppies on their balcony for this length of time before giving them over to our puppy house in Ban Taling Ngam, where they will hopefully find a new home sooner or later. We have once again successfully re-homed many puppies who came into the shelter fully vaccinated but unfortunately had to watch

many little ones get sick and die because they never had a chance to get vaccine, they were simply dropped at the shelter and no Foster parent was available.

Jay, Linda and Tom will continue spending as much time as possible, working outside the shelter in order to prevent so many unnecessary deaths. The more people who are made aware that we will still take the puppies after vaccine, the more people are prepared to keep them for a while longer, but there's still a long road ahead

Little has changed when it comes to our annoying beast called Ticks and Fleas. Several times a year we have an infestation of ticks, they are potential killers, especially in puppies, who don't have the strongest immune system.

That's why Linda and Tom are about to make the puppy House as Tick-free as possible. They will burn the inside of the house and



the grounds outside and disinfect everything. Every few months drastic 'Tick&Flea-fights' like these are necessary. Usually it does solve the problem for the time being and more little ones have the chance to survive. Any donations against ticks and fleas (like this

special comp in the picture) are highly appreciated! You wouldn't believe how easily this comp removes annoying ticks and fleas and many hours of exhausting de-ticking can be saved. However, in many cases nobody has the time to sit and brush the dogs or take them out by hand. That's why we are thankful for any sort of tick and flea powder, Frontline, Advocate or similar products. Please think of us if you come to Samui and have some luggage space left, thank you.



Not only at the temples but also at the shelter we have a constant fight against ticks and fleas. Sometimes we get dogs into the shelter completely covered with ticks, too many to count.

From November 14.-16., we sent two of our helpers to Phuket. The Humane Society International held a special training course for catching dogs with a net. The head trainer Soham Mukherjee arrived from India and tried his very best to teach our boys the best methods. Our task will be first to manufacture such a net, and then the other helpers will be trained as well and we will be able to start a new "business". We hope to catch those dogs which either do not eat our anesthetic paste or, even after swallowing it, are still so strong as to fight tooth and nail like mad. Those are the ones we hope to be able to catch with that net. I will let you know how things worked out...

In the last 13 years, over 17,000 dogs and cats have been neutered and countless vaccinations and treatments have been carried out. We offer free medical treatment for ALL stray cats and dogs, with a pick-up service even beyond our opening hours. For dogs and cats with an owner, we must ask for coverage of the medicine costs. Medicine in Thailand is rather inexpensive and those who have no money will still get medicine for free.

Also in the last four months we had to take in some more dogs and many cats in our shelter as they couldn't find a way to survive on their own.

Years ago you had a pack of dogs at every hotel; they kept the number of the cats down and prevented them from spreading all over the place. Please do help us and donate some Euros for vaccinations and castration.

Unfortunately we cannot expect any support from the "island".

TEMPLE PROJECT

Jay, Linda and Tom from the Temple-Team are also very happy, that the financial situation of the Dog and Cat Rescue has stabilized a little. For some months the Team were not able to deliver the amount of dog and cat food required to feed all the hungry mouths at the temples. The Team provides over 20 temples around the island with medical treatment and food. Due to our financial situation, only the very minimum of dog and cat food could be delivered to the temples so Jay and Linda started to divide one big 25kg of dog food into a few smaller black bags and delivered it that way, making sure everyone got at least a little something. The monks

were also very understanding and most cooked rice to mix through the dry food, stretching it that little bit further. As for the dogs and cats in the temples, well, they were just very happy to have some food every day. Thankfully we are now in the position to buy enough food again and have gone back to delivering the required amount of dog and cat food so no one has to be hungry.

Last month Jay and Tom rushed to the temple after an emergency call, where the monk awaited them with Burni in his arms and tears in his eyes.

His beloved cat had gone to the big kitchen area, where a celebration was ongoing and somebody accidently dropped a pot of boiling water, the cat was on the receiving end. Almost half of the body has been affected. The monk insisted on keeping the cat there and wanted to give the daily medication himself, as well as helping with the daily wound cleaning. Over the years this monk has learned a lot from the

She was always very weak and seemed to be constantly at the edge and in the beginning didn't respond to any medication. She was very skinny, always seemed to have a cold then several other problems accrued. Thankfully she stayed at one of the temples where the monks are more than happy to give medication and take fairly good care of the dogs. After successful treatment over several weeks, Happy got bigger and stronger and joined the huge pack of dogs at the temple. We are not sure how it happened but Happy had a very bad accident at the temple and was then attacked by some dogs while she was already in distress. She suffered major bite wounds, which damaged one leg so badly, that it had to be amputated. It was clear that beside the wounds and the pain of the amputation, Happy had also pain in the second front leg but nobody on

the island was able to fix it. Our amazing Foster-Parents Mike and his wife who is a vet, decided to give Happy a new home and adopted her.

Knowing only a specialist vet in Bangkok could help Happy to walk without pain on three legs, Mike rented a car and took Happy to Bangkok for the operation. All went well and she can now finally live up to her name and live a happy life. Thank you Mike for not thinking twice.....

PUPPY HOUSE

Many times over the last two years we have mentioned how important Foster-Parents are and how much we appreciate people helping us to FIRST vaccinate our little 4 legged friends before they then -for whatever reason- come to the puppy house at our shelter. Once fully vaccinated, it is a lot less likely for them to get sick at the shelter. Jay and Linda -in charge for the puppy dogs- almost daily have to find ways to keep puppy families safe outside the shelter, until they are fully vaccinated. We are thankful for everyone getting out of their daily routine in order to keep some puppies at their place until they are double vaccinated and strong enough for the shelter. The vaccination program takes about three weeks and we can vaccinate the puppies earliest with 6 weeks. A big THANK YOU to Axel and his wife who kindly agreed to shelter 9 puppies on their balcony for this length of time before giving them over to our puppy house in Ban Taling Ngam, where they will hopefully find a new home sooner or later. We have once again successfully re-homed many puppies who came into the shelter fully vaccinated but unfortunately had to watch

many little ones get sick and die because they never had a chance to get vaccine, they were simply dropped at the shelter and no Foster parent was available.

Jay, Linda and Tom will continue spending as much time as possible, working outside the shelter in order to prevent so many unnecessary deaths. The more people who are made aware that we will still take the puppies after vaccine, the more people are prepared to keep them for a while longer, but there's still a long road ahead

Little has changed when it comes to our annoying beast called Ticks and Fleas. Several times a year we have an infestation of ticks, they are potential killers, especially in puppies, who don't have the strongest immune system.

That's why Linda and Tom are about to make the puppy House as Tick-free as possible. They will burn the inside of the house and



the grounds outside and disinfect everything. Every few months drastic 'Tick&Flea-fights' like these are necessary. Usually it does solve the problem for the time being and more little ones have the chance to survive. Any donations against ticks and fleas (like this

special comp in the picture) are highly appreciated! You wouldn't believe how easily this comp removes annoying ticks and fleas and many hours of exhausting de-ticking can be saved. However, in many cases nobody has the time to sit and brush the dogs or take them out by hand. That's why we are thankful for any sort of tick and flea powder, Frontline, Advocate or similar products. Please think of us if you come to Samui and have some luggage space left, thank you.



Not only at the temples but also at the shelter we have a constant fight against ticks and fleas. Sometimes we get dogs into the shelter completely covered with ticks, too many to count.

From November 14.-16., we sent two of our helpers to Phuket. The Humane Society International held a special training course for catching dogs with a net. The head trainer Soham Mukherjee arrived from India and tried his very best to teach our boys the best methods. Our task will be first to manufacture such a net, and then the other helpers will be trained as well and we will be able to start a new "business". We hope to catch those dogs which either do not eat our anesthetic paste or, even after swallowing it, are still so strong as to fight tooth and nail like mad. Those are the ones we hope to be able to catch with that net. I will let you know how things worked out...

From my last newsletter you know that we have restarted our dogadoption program: a lot of pet lovers have asked us to continue and our financial situation has thankfully improved again.

Thank you very much again to all the sponsors and helpers from all over the world. Because of your help, since 13 years every dog and cat can be helped for free on Koh Samui. Stray animals which have not found a place to survive on their own on Koh Samui can be brought into the shelter.

Because of your donations, we can still neuter at least six animals every day. In the last 13 years, over 17,000 dogs and cats have been neutered and countless vaccinations and treatments have been carried out. We offer free medical treatment for ALL stray cats and dogs, with a pick-up service even beyond our opening hours. For dogs and cats with an owner, we must ask for coverage of the medicine costs. Medicine in Thailand is rather inexpensive and those who have no money will still get medicine for free.

Also in the last four months we had to take in some more dogs and many cats in our shelter as they couldn't find a way to survive on their own.
