If absolutely necessary, the injured or sick animal is brought to the shelter for further treatments. Our work includes a lot of street work and many little villages surrounding the temples.






The dogs were totally proud of their new collars!











#### **BEVORE and AFTER!**

We found this little puppy abandoned at one of the temples we work. Even though her head is bloody and her body is covered in wounds cost by mange, this little puppy we call "JoJo" is full of life and was totally happy when we got to the temple and started treating her. JoJo was never vaccinated so we decided to treat her at the temple with weekly injections and found a monk who was prepared to give medication. The risk of her getting sick at the shelter without being vaccinated was too high.....







Life got better for Jojo inwith only a couple of weeks....



And today JoJo is a young and healthy young temple dog, wearing proudly her new collar

#### Fostering saves many lifes....

Like JoJo, we have many unvaccinated puppies dropped at the shelter so we are always thankful for Foster-people who are prepared to take the little ones home until they"re fully vaccinated.

Floh is a puppy we found at one of the temples. He was one of many abandoned puppies but completely covered in wounds and the maggots started to make their way through the little ones body. Instead of bringing this unvaccinated puppy to the shelter, Tom from our Temple-Team decided to take him home, do the daily wound cleaning and made sure, that little Floh got his medication and a good amount of cuddles every day.





In a matter of a week, Floh's wounds closed and he turned into a strong and happy little puppy who was more than ready to return to his many temple friends.


ONE WEEK LATER......

70 Vaccinations / month 65 Wound cleaning / month 100 Mange treatment / month

70 Animals taken in for neutering / last 3 months

30 Animals taken in for further medical treatment / 3 months

Thankfully many Monks are very supportive when it comes to showing us injured or sick animals


### Every month we deliver over 1,000 kg! of dog and cat food to the temples








